The Big Table

The new year means a new Gospel for us to explore and inhabit. Last year we walked through Mark and learned about *The Jesus Way*. Mark is the shortest Gospel and like a Hemmingway novel, every word is carefully chosen. This year we journey through my favorite Gospel—Luke. Luke is giant. It is not only the longest Gospel but the longest book in the New Testament. Chapter 1 has 80 verses! Luke is like a John Steinbeck novel—a sprawling tome with epic symbolism and scenes that stick in your mind forever. Who can forget the Christmas story, the Good Samaritan or the Prodigal son? Throughout 2019, we will walk through Luke's Gospel and witness the universal scope of God's mission in Jesus Christ. More than anyone else, Luke emphasizes the expansive reach of God's kingdom. The angels tell the shepherds that Jesus' birth is good news of great joy for *all people* (2:10). The genealogy in Luke 3 traces Jesus' lineage all the way back to "Adam, son of God." Jesus' last words are that repentance and forgiveness of sins are to be proclaimed to all (24:47). In other words, God's kingdom is here for everyone, not just a select few.

The ministry of Jesus in Luke demonstrates what that universal kingdom looks like, namely the inclusion of the poor and the outcast. Jesus' own mission statement speaks of good news to the poor, release of the captives, sight for the blind and freedom for the oppressed (4:18-19). Luke is the most socially conscious of all the Gospels, and Jesus is constantly getting in trouble for healing, and associating with outcasts. The religious leaders grumble that Jesus welcomes sinners and even eats with them (15:1-2). This last point is of particular interest. Everywhere you turn in Luke, Jesus is eating with people or telling stories about banquets, feasts and parties. Luke is the Gospel of *The Big Table*. The vision Jesus paints over and over again is that the kingdom of God is a party where all are welcome and none are compelled to come and feast together at one big table. The invitation is universal, but Jesus goes out of his way to personally invite those who feel excluded and unworthy—you too are welcome to eat! The only qualification is the humility it takes of sitting next to someone who smells funny, looks and thinks different than you. The religious leaders of Jesus' day had a hard time with that. Many refused to join such a big table, and 2000 years later many still do. Yet the invitation remains open to us all, for one day, "People will come from east and west, from north and south, and will eat in the kingdom of God" (Luke 13:29). This is the future God is creating, and we are free to start eating now.

In 2019, let us join one another at *The Big Table*. Our church knows how to cook and serve great meals. We do so at Community Kitchen, in the Lord's Supper, at congregational meals, and in our own homes. In all our feasting this year, may we look for more opportunities to extend a personal invitation to those who feel outcast. For all are welcome at God's table, even you.

JANUARY SESSION HIGHLIGHTS

Session met January 9 with 11 members present. Members were encouraged to attend Presbytery officer training at Hilliard Presbyterian Church Saturday January 12. Session approved a new electronic giving company that will be less costly compared to Push-Pay fees. Session endorsed the continuation of the Community Kitchen for the coming year. A plan to examine the membership rolls was approved and will begin soon. Team reports were received and members signed up for participation on a team. The Finance Committee members were approved in accordance with the financial committee policies. Per Capita was discussed and the report will be sent to Presbytery of our intent to pay the full Per Capita. For the year 2019 the full Per Capita for each member of the congregation is \$35.75 which is broken down \$8.95 to General Assembly, \$3.25 to Synod, and \$23.55 to the Presbytery of Scioto Valley. Members of our congregation are urged to make a separate donation to help cover this expense. A final budget was approved and will be presented at the February 10, 2019 Annual meeting.

FINANCIAL UPDATE

The Stewardship and Finance Team wants to keep vou informed of our financial status. The final result of the Stewardship Campaign was 80 total pledges, 67 with a defined dollar amount, for \$204,000. This is an average pledge of just over \$3000.00, which is very good. The response from the congregation was tremendous. However, our 2019 Budget is still in a deficit position even with this generous pledging. The issue is simply fewer pledges. Going back 12 years, we had 128 pledge units, and now it is 80. We have cut the expense side of the budget very significantly, and may have to reduce even more. We still need all of us to continue to increase our giving as much as possible. For a start, please donate an extra amount equal to your per capita assessment from Presbytery. This is \$35.75 for 2019. We will continue to keep you apprised of our financial status.
