






CONGRATULATIONS GRADUATES!

PIPE ORGAN UPDATE

Following several years of planning for its re-leathering, our pipe organ was removed over a seven-day period starting the day after Easter. It is now at the Bunn=Minnick Pipe Organ in Columbus and the work is well underway.

As you know by now, each of the 1,774 pipes is activated by a little leather valve. With the exception of the additions made to the organ in 1982, this leather is original and dates from the organ's original manufacture in 1929. That the leather has lasted this long is a testament to the excellent quality of the workmanship when the original organ was built by the Page Organ Co. of Lima, Ohio. On the average, pipe organ leather needs to be replaced when it is 40-50 years old. This leather has lasted for 88 years.

As the organ was dismantled, it quickly became apparent that this work is absolutely essential and that we are doing it at the right time. Many of the old leathers were split, others were coming loose from their mountings, and all of them were very brittle. A mere light touch on a number of them caused them to fall apart. Putting it another way, without this work the deterioration would have steadily continued to the point that the organ would likely have become unplayable in just a year or two. Interestingly, when the wind chests were opened to expose the valves, they were found to be full of coal dust. The church was heated with coal until around 1960 and the coal bin was right next to the organ blower room in the basement. The blower intakes simply sucked in the dust and it ended up inside the wind chests.

The Bunn=Minnick folks have been keeping me well informed on the progress of the work. They have e-mailed a number of pictures and some of the chests are already sporting their new leather. In addition, the pipes themselves are undergoing a thorough cleaning along with any needed repairs and voicing improvements.

The other part of the project involves replacing the bearings on the organ blower, which is also original. This work is expected to start in the next few weeks.

While the organ is "away" we will be repairing the plaster ceiling in the uppermost pipe chamber. Some of the plaster has become loose and small pieces have been flaking off and falling into the open tops of the pipes. Our plan is to cover the entire ceiling with plywood, which will eliminate any further deterioration. This part of the work is the church's responsibility and we are currently seeking a contractor to do it for us.

Barring any unforeseen difficulties, the organ is scheduled to be back around the first week in August. Now I must caution you that as all of these new parts "wear in" and learn to work smoothly together, we must expect a few glitches in the form of "ciphers" or stuck notes....pipes sounding continually. This is normal and the organ technicians do everything they can to minimize that problem. The problem, if it develops at all, should be resolved within a few weeks.

Each week in the bulletin we list the total moneys pledged and received toward our goal of \$40,000. There is a display outside the sanctuary that also lists how our fundraising is going. Frankly, we have a long way to go. The total cost of this project is \$85,000 and Session determined that, after using existing resources, we need to raise an additional \$40,000. The need is great; please give what you can to help keep this grand instrument playing for generations to come.

Now for a word about the “other organ.” If you’ve been to church recently, you’ve noticed that we moved the electronic organ from Campbell Hall into the sanctuary to fill in for the main organ. Since it is self-contained in terms of its speakers, we have a microphone on it to spread the sound more evenly throughout the sanctuary and overflow area. This organ was built by the Conn Co. back in the late 1970s and it belonged to Marguerite Huston Burkhart, who was our organist from 1947 to 1979, when I took over. Marguerite’s daughter, Patsy Knecht, is a life-long member of our church and plays in the bell choir. This organ was in Marguerite’s home and when she moved to Pickaway Manor she graciously donated the organ to the church for use in Campbell Hall. We are fortunate to have it and it is working out nicely in providing worship music and leading the hymns. But make no mistake; it has its limitations since it is actually a theatre organ designed for home use. For example: for the first time in over 35 years we won’t be hearing the majestic “Victory at Sea” medley at the close of the Memorial Day weekend service this year. But I have selected another grand composition to close out that service. And I am grateful to have this organ to play during this interim, as my abilities at the piano are minimal at best! The church is grateful to Pat Beathard for her talents at the piano....and the organ.

We will keep you updated on the progress of this major pipe organ renovation. Thank you for your support.
