ZIKA VIRUS DISEASE

I promised the Congregational Care and Nurture Team that I would write an article for the Pres-Line about the Zika problem some time ago, but the known information kept changing all spring, so I guess it is the last chance I will have before summer so-here it goes!! The following information comes from a national nurses' online magazine, the Ohio Nurses Association Magazine and the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), a source that I often have used in my career as a Public Health Nurse.

First of all, what is Zika Virus Disease? It is a disease caused by the Zika virus which is primarily spread through the bite of an infected Aedes species mosquito. The most common symptoms of Zika are fever, rash, joint pain, and conjunctivitis (red eyes). The disease is usually mild with symptoms lasting several days to a week. About one in five people with Zika will get sick and because the illness is usually mild, many people will not realize they have been infected. The symptoms usually begin within two to seven days after they have been bitten by an infected mosquito.

How is Zika transmitted? It is primarily transmitted by the mosquito but it can also be transmitted from a pregnant mother to her baby during her pregnancy or around the time of the birth. Men who have Zika may transfer this disease to their sexual partner, and the disease is thought to be passed to the partner for up to six months after the mosquito bite. So far, there is no vaccine to prevent Zike and no medication to treat the virus.

What countries have Zika? The countries that have Zika change over time but so far tropical areas have the most cases, although by mid-May the United States had seen 472 cases (44 pregnant women). Check the CDC Travelers Health site for the most updated information. It has recently been reported that many more northern areas will probably see Zika this coming summer, and that the mosquito is expected to be present as far north as Ohio. The mosquito that carries Zika is present in daytime hours, not only in the evening like most of the mosquitoes we are accustomed to here in this area.

What can people do to prevent Zika? Since there is no vaccine, the best way is to avoid being bitten. Here is how: 1. Wear long sleeved shirts and long pants. 2. Stay in places that use air conditioning or at least screens to keep mosquitoes outside. 3. Use EPA registered insect repellents. 4. If you use sun sunscreen apply it before applying the repellent. 5. Be sure to follow the directions on the repellent. 6. Sleep under a mosquito bed net if you are overseas or outside and not able to protect yourself from mosquito bites.

The CDC monitors for diseases quite effectively, equips diagnostic laboratories, and supports mosquito control programs both in the United States and around the world. Zika is not a new disease, outbreaks previously have been reported in tropical Africa, Southeast Asia, and the Pacific Islands and it will likely spread into new areas. A year ago the virus was reported in Brazil. The National Wildlife Magazine recently reported that the Aedes mosquito wintered under the ground on Capital Hill in Washington, D.C. this past winter. Although no Zika was found in this population it is quite troubling that it's range is so expanded in this country. According to the scientist who discovered this, it is unprecedented for this mosquito to be breeding in this climate!


