The Gospel is Public

Our journey through the Gospel of Luke is ending. Advent is just around the corner and with it comes a new church year and new Gospel in which to soak our imaginations. Before we leave Luke behind, the message of the Big Table deserves one last consideration. One of the great temptations of the church is to privatize the good news of Jesus Christ. Perhaps the most influential American theological contribution has been the insistence on a personal response to God. It's not enough to simply be born into a Christian family or be a member of a church. The American Church has taught that individuals must personally respond to the good news of God in Christ. God cares not just about humanity writ large, but about you. That's true in so far as it goes, but the downside of such teaching is that we are tempted to think that the personal is also private. We begin to think that our relationship with God is simply a private matter, and public concerns are not God's concerns. Yet over and over throughout the Gospel of Luke we see that God's concerns are personal but never private. Luke 15 and 16 drive this home in both comforting and disturbing ways.

Is there a more comforting chapter of scripture than the parables of Luke 15, the lost sheep, the lost coin and the lost sons? Through them all we witness that God so cares about individuals that there is no length to which God will not go to see all his children come home. The great conclusion of these parables is a father inviting his petulant child home, saying, "Son, you are always with me, and everything I have is yours" (15:31). Could it be that God says this to every resentful son and to every wayward daughter? The amazing grace of God is sweeter and more personal than we have ever imagined.

Then come the disturbing parables of Luke 16, which home in on the difficult teaching that "No one can serve two masters... You cannot serve God and wealth" (16:13). The chapter concludes with the parable of Lazarus and the rich man, a stark reminder that God is greatly concerned with how we treat the poor and how we spend our money. These are not private matters, nor are they secondary concerns to God. How we treat the Lazarus's in our lives is the true test of whether we understand the good news of God's love made so clear in Luke 15. In other words, the gospel is both personal and public. It is true that God loves you personally, but the Big Table isn't just set for you. God is not your personal chef come to throw a party for you and your friends. God is setting a table for everyone, which means God is concerned with how we treat everyone. Father Richard Rohr loves to say, "How we do anything is how we do everything." How we treat the poor, the orphan and the immigrant is how we treat God, ourselves...everything. How we treat the rivers and the oceans, the land and animals is how we treat everything. There is no private relationship with God.

The good news is that God loves you more than you know. The good news is also that God loves everyone and everything with that same fierce, personal and public love. May our life together be focused not merely on ourselves, but on the world for which Jesus lived, died and rose again.

Time to get your flu shot — I am preaching again, as I do every year! It is recommended that you get a flu shot every year by the end of October. CHURCH MASONRY AND SLATE REPAIRS

For those of you who might not be aware, the Trustees just completed an ~\$40,000 project to make some repairs to the exterior of our church. The scope of the work included:

Removing the upper ~20 feet of the large, no longer in use chimney in the west wall of our church that was badly deteriorated.

Closing and filling in the exterior entrance on the west side of the church to the kitchen off of the former social room. This entrance, which was no longer required or used since the accessible entrance was installed in the rear wall of the social room, was the source of some long-term maintenance issues.

Grinding out and replacing the mortar between all of the stones on the front part of the east, Campbell Hall portion of the building and beneath the steps to the two front entrances to the sanctuary.

Grinding out and replacing some isolated areas of damaged and missing mortar in the exterior walls of the older, sanctuary portion of the building.

Cutting out and re-caulking a number of deteriorated caulk joints on the exterior of both parts in the building.

Applying a water repellent on the exterior walls of the older, sanctuary portion of the building.

Such work is periodically required on especially older masonry buildings. The Trustees last undertook similar work on the older, sanctuary portion of the building in 2010. No such work had been performed on the newer east part of the building since it was upgraded and expanded in 2005.

The Trustees have also entered into a contract with Durable Slate to perform some repairs to the slate shingles on the older, sanctuary portion of the building and the steeple sometime next month. In addition, they will reattach the ground cable to the lightening rod on the steeple, which became detached from the lightening rod sometime earlier this year. While the required work on the lightening rod is unusual, some repairs to the slate roof on the sanctuary portion of the building have typically been required every 1-2 years.
